

Ezekiel chapters 10-11

In this vision of Ezekiel's visit to Jerusalem, where is the Glory of the Lord in the beginning [10:4], and where is it at the end [11:23] of this passage?

What task did the Lord send the man dressed in linen to accomplish? Why?

What accusation did the sons of Israel who still lived in Jerusalem make regarding those who had been taken into exile? What promises did God give in response? [11:17-21]

Ezekiel chapter 33

God told Ezekiel "As for you, son of man, I have made you a watchman". Was this assignment a great honor, or was it a severe punishment?

"House of Israel, I will judge each of you according to his behavior." Does this statement mark a change in the way God relates to His people?

The survivors of the destruction of Jerusalem argues that they were still entitled to possess the land, based on God's promise to Abraham. What was God's response to them?

What warning does God give Ezekiel about his fellow exiles? [30-33]

Ezekiel chapters 43-44

Again, where is the Glory of the Lord? "I threw myself face down." Why? [44:4]

Why is Ezekiel describing the design of the coming new temple to the children of Israel? [43:10-11; 44:4-9]

Given that Ezekiel is describing, not the second (Herod's) Temple, but a new temple to be built during the end times – after Christ has changed our perspective of the Law – why all the emphasis on the laws associated with the new Temple?
